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This semester the Curriculum Committee prepared 64 courses. The Scheduling Committee did a stupendous job finding venues for these courses along with trying to reduce as many conflicts as possible. The Registration Committee worked diligently processing member applications getting the majority of members

signed up for their various selections. The Ambassador Committee persevered until they found members to serve in each of the courses.

And, as smoothly as this went for most of us, there continues to be some hiccups each semester. Last minute course changes to the schedule due to a variety of reasons, venue changes, and wait lists for some courses. The ambassadors have been especially busy this fall with last minute changes necessitating contacting course registrants keeping them informed. In this regard, changes and cancellations are posted on the SOAR website as quickly as possible. A number of us try to check the website just before we leave to attend a session, not a bad idea, if you can do it.

A growing inconvenience for both members and presenters is that there are members who register for courses, but then do not attend for whatever reason. We ask you to notify the SOAR office if you decide not to attend a course which you originally signed up for. This may lead to a presenter preparing too many copies of materials to be distributed, a member on a wait list not being able to take the course or, embarrassingly, a presenter expecting say 25 attendees only to find 10 or 12 members actually attending. So, once again, we ask you to be a conscientious member and if you change your mind (for whatever reason) and wish to cancel your registration in a course, inform the SOAR office as soon as possible.

Our new Administrative Assistant, Katherine Lenz, has kept us all on track to get our various tasks completed this fall, and she is doing a great job.

Many committees are busy updating their tasks. Some will require changes to our By-laws. We will need to vote on these at the Spring Luncheon -- you will receive the changes in the spring newsletter.

We are off to another good year and I certainly hope you are enjoying the sessions you are attending. I know I am, and I look forward to a rich set of offerings for spring.
