Ad-hoc Long Range Planning Committee

The Board of Directors has directed the Committee to report this fall on how to use technology to enhance our service to members. Now that SOAR has over 400 members and curriculum planning involves more than 70 courses, we must plan for greater efficiency. There are three areas that demand attention: administrative processes, classroom support and budgeting.

We will investigate software solutions to integrating the increasingly complex process by which we proceed from curricular planning, through classroom scheduling to registration. We will explore the potential for members, or perhaps paid student assistants, to support the technology that is increasingly needed by our presenters. Finally we will investigate the budgetary implications of software subscriptions (rather than purchase), cloud storage and services, and hardware replacement cycles.

Waiting List Protocol

Although we have been able to average more than 60 courses a semester for several years, invariably several classes fill up fast. Enrollment caps are determined by venue capacity and/or instructor preference. If a course reaches its limit, SOAR's computer database automatically starts compiling a list of additional members who wish to enroll. Subsequently, as spaces re-open, we enroll those listed in the order of their registrations.

It's easy for SOAR to move a wait-listed member into a course when an opening occurs. Please remember, however, that to do this the SOAR office must be notified of the vacancy ahead of time.
