WHEN you choose from the long list of available SOAR courses, you are benefitting from Jim Barry's tireless cultivation of potential presenters. He recruits all of the presenters to teach SOAR classes. He has been developing our program since he joined the Curriculum Committee in 2002 and has increased the number of courses offered to members from 16 to over 60 (adding new areas such as games and physical activities). He maintains a list of several hundred potential presenters and combs local sources and professional journals to keep track of their activity and to congratulate them for professional accomplishments. WHEN Jim has completed his list of presenters and presentations, **Ed Russell** goes to work to secure details about the planned courses.
