We judge the current semester to be a promising start to our venture into virtual learning, but we are eager to serve yet more of our members in Spring 2021. Well before classes start, the Technology Team plans to offer individualized instruction in using Zoom so that more of SOARers will feel comfortable with this style of instruction. We are grateful to the tech assistants (Mark Coleman, Karen Collins, Mark Davis, Robin Hutchinson, and Leah Zelkowitz) who have been organized and guided by Jerry Sharp and Janet van Weringh for the success of the Fall 2020 semester. Each course presents somewhat different challenges.

SOAR's Fall 2020 semester is proceeding. A total of 67 SOAR members have registered for our 10 Zoom courses, a total of 149 registrations (there may be more participants as couples and friends may be watching together). Members can also access two pre-recorded classes.
