There were 5 great courses offered during the "spring part" of our SOAR spring semester!) Chanchal Singh did a two session course called "Fun with Math: Puzzles and Pastimes."

He amazed his participants by showing them some very strange phenomena based just on the simple functions of adding, subtracting multiplying and dividing.



We also had a five session course going; it met once, then twice a week during the last two weeks. This was "The Great War: The Western Front (1914-1917), with Lou Ann Lange. She brought in readings, film and PowerPoint to accompany her lectures, which give participants a first-hand feel for what this war was like and what ramifications it had for the future.

The remaining three courses met only once, but that

did not diminish their importance or the pleasure the participants had in learning about these topics. Clarkson Professor Ken Visser introduced us to "Small Wind Turbine Technology," a topic that is locally current in our region. Another Clarkson researcher,





Professor Dick Partch, talked about his research involving "Sandpaper, Toothpaste and Silicon Wafers," an intriguing title which led to an understanding how diverse things can be inter-related. The last class of the semester – which

started and ended in Week Eleven – took us across the border to Canada ("Canada: Questions and Answers" led

by St. Lawrence Professor Joseph Jockel). Topics that day ranged from what is Canada's biggest export (*cars!*) to the psyche of the Canadians (*described as the "decaffeinated calmer Americans"*).



And so, we have come to the end of another SOAR semester. Having taken, or dropped in on, all but two of the courses, I feel qualified to pronounce this semester as one of the best! What an array of shared knowledge and expertise and what opportunities to learn and do things. And what an incredible group of presenters we had! THANKS TO ALL YOU PRESENTERS!
